About Wanneroo

The City of Wanneroo is a powerhouse of growth and opportunity, covering an area of 684km² that includes 36 suburbs.

As Western Australia's largest growing local government area, 20 people move into the City every day largely because of our relaxed lifestyle and close proximity to National Parks and 32kms of coastline.

The population has doubled over the past decade and is currently 198,000. That figure is predicted to double again over the next 25 years and by 2070, the City's population is forecast to reach more than half a million people.

A key focus is creating local jobs for local people and an additional 2,800 jobs are needed each year to support the City's rapidly growing population.

The City is proud to be one of the most culturally and linguistically diverse populations in Western Australia.

Among the City's many strengths is its enormous economic potential and desire to be the best it can be, a place that residents are proud to call home.



The City is focusing on transformational initiatives to stimulate major investment and economic growth, with the diversification of its economic base.

The City contributes 38 per cent of the total gross value of agricultural commodities produced in the Perth region and those agricultural industries also have the potential to grow into new job and economic dynamos.

About the NGAA

More than 20 of the fastest growing councils around Australia are members of the National Growth Areas Alliance (NGAA).

As the peak advocacy group for outer suburbs – from Penrith in Sydney's west to Wanneroo in Perth's north – the Alliance works with its members to advocate to state and federal governments for a fair go for the growing outer suburbs.

NGAA populations are growing at double the national rate. Collectively, Australia's outer suburbs are currently home to five million people – and counting! In just 15 years, another 2.5 million people will call our areas home.

In addition to highlighting the challenges – and opportunities – presented by such growth, the Alliance also works with industry and other stakeholders to advocate for communities getting the infrastructure and services they need and deserve.

The Fund our Future campaign, run by NGAA in the lead-up to the 2016 federal election, delivered on three sought-after projects and was instrumental in securing the City Deal for western Sydney.

Some of NGAA's latest research shows the infrastructure backlog in outer suburbs nationally currently stands at \$50 billion dollars – but that it will grow to \$73 billion by 2031 unless something is done now.

NGAA is not the only one saying that infrastructure in outer suburbs is at breaking point: Infrastructure Australia has underlined the need to better support population growth in hotspots like the outer suburbs.

Brian is a leader in demographic analysis and property trends and has extensive experience in forecasting demand for retirement living Aged Care and is currently advising on the development of major health hubs on the Sunshine Coast and in Victoria in relation to the Sunshine Health + Wellbeing Cluster. Director of Facilities and Camps, Department of Sport and Recreation

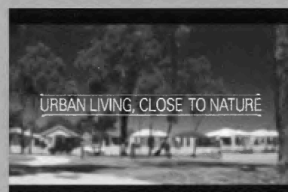
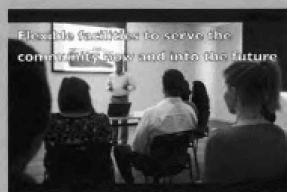

In his current role, Rob is the Principal Advisor to the state government on sport and recreation facilities planning, design and management. He oversees all capital development projects, which in recent years has seen major budget injection to transform Western Australia’s state level sporting infrastructure and renew facilities reaching the end of their useful life.

Rob has authored a number of the Departments industry guidance documents, such as the asset management and life cycle cost guides. Rob’s team works with all Local Governments across the state and state sporting associations to assist in planning and delivering community infrastructure and has commissioned important research on public open space that is now influencing planning policy.
